



Vice Commodore comments

Let me start by saying I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season! As my Vice Commodore year comes to a close, I've learned a lot about the complexities of managing the Dining room and Bar. It was a good year, in terms of the financial profit/loss. We had a loss of only \$45,000. How can I consider this a good year? Well, over the past 20 years, we have always had a loss in this area. Those losses have ranged as far as \$100,000. This improvement is mostly a result of tighter management by Sam, Christine and Chef Kadrian as they better controlled their costs of labor and goods. Of more concern is that it was not a great year in terms of our members making use of our club. It's hard to imagine that we can't seem to make the Dining room and Bar break even. Over the past year, we decreased our pricing and added more grill menu items at or under \$20. We also have improved the quality and consistency of our dishes. Even so, we saw a decrease in the number of meals served this past year. Since our membership numbers have slightly increased, this year, (kudos to the Membership and Marketing Committees) it means we are not eating at the club as often as we have in the past. I have to admit I'm at a loss to explain this trend. Better food at lower prices should bring in more business, but it hasn't. Hopefully, we can find the correct recipe for success in the Dining room and Bar in the coming year.

The Entertainment Committee, chaired by Mary Theresa Seitz, has done a phenomenal job of running a variety of great events. They have quite a few upcoming events planned. Please be sure to read about what is coming up. Also, keep an eye on our club calendar, website, social media, and newsletters for more details on upcoming events. Speaking of the calendar, we do have a planned shut-down during the last two weeks of January and first week of February to replace the kitchen floor, replace the stove and refinish the dance floor. We're optimistic that we will be open for the Super Bowl, though. In the meantime, please take advantage of the reciprocal arrangements we have with many of the other area clubs. Please look for the note on reciprocal clubs in this newsletter. Please come in often and bring your friends and family. I know you have a lot of options in Buffalo, but this is your club and the views are unparalleled. Let's make this your "go to" spot.

Rear Commodore Comments

How is it possible that yet another year passes quickly forcing us to set our sights on a New Year and a new regime. Welcome 2019 and Stephen Munschauer, Rear Commodore elect. I'm pleased to report that I am turning over the Point Abino station in good order all tidied up and closed for the season. Once again it goes without saying we owe our appreciation to Ruth and her staff for an outstanding season of summer fun. Thank you to the Point Abino committee for their dedication and guidance throughout 2018 helping to make the Point Abino station so enjoyable for all our BYC members. December 8th found many of our volunteers up at Point Abino for another successful work party, disconnecting the floating docks off the walls and floating them to the center of the basin. Thank you to all these volunteers who braved the elements to get this very necessary task done on a very bitterly cold day. Each year the question arises as to why we wait to so late in the year to move the docks. Why not do this when the weather is more ideal? In the early fall months, we typically experience the more violent wind storms and the docks are safer from these storms when connected to the main piers. The docks can rise and fall with the change of the water levels. If we were to float them out to the middle of the basin earlier in the Fall season, we run the risk of the docks moving sideways and banging into one another.

It's ideal to float and move the docks to center of the basin just prior to the first chance of ice forming. If we were to leave them attached to the main piers after ice has formed, we run the risk of the docks twisting and pivoting at their connection points thus running the risk of them snapping at their connections. They are safer to be floated to the middle and tied off just before the threat of ice because now they can move freely sideways once ice has formed. In the forthcoming year look for improvements of additional new docks, safety equipment and clubhouse facilities. The Point Abino committee is already working hard to make this new year memorable for all the BYC members. All in all, Point Abino is a jewel that all of us as members should utilize and take advantage of. Thank you all for this year! Looking forward to seeing you at the Porter clubhouse over the next several months.

Over the years, we've witnessed a lot of feel good programs, where local groups and organizations come together to help others overcome adversity. Recently, I learned that The Buffalo Yacht Club had teamed up with the WNY Maritime Charter School, to offer cadets from the Maritime Careers class a chance to learn how to sail, courtesy of the Buffalo Yacht Club Foundation.

The other day I swung by The Buffalo Yacht Club, to talk to club member Howard Hain, who is an advocate for the program. Hain was standing with Master Chief Petty Officer (USCG Ret.) Scott Pugh, who was orchestrating the program. Pugh teaches Naval Science at the school, and feels that there are important life lessons that go hand-in hand with getting students out on the waters, instead of simply learning in the classroom. The program also includes boat building exercises at The Buffalo Maritime Center, via the Hand to Hand program. The diverse programming offers students a chance to get their hands dirty one day, before getting their feet wet the following day.

What is especially important to remember is that these young people have never sailed, or even interacted with the water for that matter. Most of them have had no training in building anything from scratch, yet they start by building their own tool boxes, which they get to take home with them once the course is over. After building the toolboxes, the next step is to build an actual rowboat - the same rowboats that can be seen floating in the middle of Delaware Lake. Pugh told me that some of the students were deathly afraid of the boats that they were making, and could not comprehend that they would one day be able to say, with pride, that they had built them, and could row them.

By the time they are finished with the three week program, the students have built boats, and learned to sail on Lake Erie. None of this would be possible without the incredible working relationship between the Buffalo Yacht Club, The Buffalo Maritime Center, and the WNY Maritime Charter School. This is a brand new program that is being implemented with hopes that it can be replicated in years to come. The joint effort just goes to show that anything is possible, as long as you have the tools, the expertise,

and the facilities that all three institutions retain, and share.

On the day that I witnessed the students learning to tack back and forth along the Black Rock Channel, I could not believe that this was the first time that any of them had ever sailed. Sailing instructor Katie Braungart, who designed the sailing curriculum for the students, was genuinely impressed with their ability to take the knowledge that they had learned in the classroom and apply it to the real world. As I followed behind the sailboat in a dinghy, I noticed one student look over the edge of the boat and exclaim, "Is that seaweed?!" I also heard that another student had to be reassured that there were not sharks in Lake Erie. This is how far removed these students have been from a waterfront that is mere minutes away from where they grew up. Moving forward, the students will be intimately familiar with the waterfront. They will have a practical understanding of math and science. They will also be better candidates for employment, which is the end goal of any program of this nature. Most of these students are not dreaming of college. Rather, they are bent on finding a good job, using the trade skills that they are learning. Those skills include being able to listen, follow commands, understand safety regulations, work with tools, work together, think on the fly, make important decisions, and deal with their fears, while broadening their horizons.

These types of programs are funded through the BYC Foundation, which is always in need of donations to fund the innovative programming. The Buffalo Yacht Club Foundation is a 501(c)(3) organization and contributions are tax deductible subject to applicable law.

Dress Code: The Saturn dress code is intended to promote a level of decorum consistent with the surroundings and atmosphere of the Club. All members are responsible for ensuring that their family members and guests observe the dress code, which is required of all adults and children aged 12 years and older.

In all matters of attire members are expected to exercise discretion, good judgment, and respect for other members and their guests.

Definitions:

·Formal or "Black Tie." Gentlemen: tuxedos. Ladies: formal dresses, gowns, or slacks.

·Semi-Formal. Gentlemen: coats and ties with dress trousers. Ladies: dresses, skirts, or tailored slacks.

·Club Casual. Gentlemen: khakis or trousers, collared shirts. Shirt tails are to be tucked inside at all times. Ladies: casual slacks with appropriate tops. No denim is included under this definition.

·Appropriate Dress Denim. Full length dark blue or black jeans free of holes, tears, or frays. Shirt tails are to be tucked inside at all times.

Standards The minimum standard throughout the clubhouse is Club Casual, except as follows:

·The attire required in the Red Room during the evening is Semi-Formal. (except as allowed by the Management on an over-flow basis).

·Appropriate Dress Denim is acceptable at all times in the Grill and in the Lanes.

·Appropriate Denim is acceptable in the Delaware Room and Courtyard on Friday and Saturday.

·On Saturday until 5:00 PM more casual dress is acceptable in the Grill only.

The following attire is never acceptable in any area of the clubhouse except the FFC:

·Athletic wear, tank, halter, or jogging tops, untucked shirts, collared shirts unbuttoned more than one button, shorts, baseball caps, spandex, open midriiffs, leggings, extremely short hemlines, extremely casual or beach footwear.

The management shall have the discretion to set a standard different than that set forth above on a case by case basis.




